Agenda Item 5 – A: Amendment to Agreement No. CSPP-6321 Resolution No. 4 – State Preschool Program

State preschool classes are available for children living within district boundaries who have an eligible birthdate and whose family gross income does not exceed the income ceilings established by the California Department of Education. The curriculum and strategies utilized in the preschool classroom are aligned with the California Preschool Learning Foundations. Parent involvement and education are key components of the preschool program, including classes that teach parents how to develop early literacy at home. State preschool classes have been in place for over 22 years in the Garden Grove Unified School District.

The California State Preschool Program is increasing the Maximum Reimbursable Amount (MRA) payable to \$4,636,526 from \$4,410,006 and the Maximum Rate per child day enrollment payable to \$40.45 from \$38.53. The amendment will increase our current funding amount by \$226,520.

Education Code 41020 requires that, by April 1, the governing board of each school district shall provide for annual audit of all funds, books, records, accounts, and financial statements and for a compliance audit of federally assisted programs.

The firm of Christy White Accountancy Corporation (CWAC) has performed the financial audit since 2009-10. The CWAC currently has a three-year agreement with the district and is proposing to perform the 2016-17 financial audit of all funds and review of federal and state programs as year two of the contract at a fee of \$73,360.

The auditor will perform procedures necessary to render an opinion as to whether or not the district's financial statements are free from material misstatement, management has complied with laws and regulations, and a system of internal controls has been established and maintained.

Agenda Item 6 – D: Authorization to Participate in the California Multiple Award Schedules – Purchase of Information Technology Products and Services (Contract No. 3-17-36-0098B)

Effective October 12, 1994, the State of California approved the use of California Multiple Award Schedules (CMAS) by local governments (i.e. city, county, district, or other local governmental body empowered to expend public funds) for information technology products and services. Using a CMAS contract would be a cost-effective manner of procurement for information technology products and services.

Public Contracts Code Sections 10298, 10299, 12100 provide that the governing board of any school district, without advertising for bids, may authorize any public agency to purchase equipment and services for its use in the manner in which the public agency is authorized by law to make such purchases. The State of California authorized school districts to purchase product and services from GRM Information Management Services of California, LLC (CMAS Contract No. 3-17-36-0098B) on the California Multiple Award Schedules in accordance with the same specifications, terms, and conditions. The State of California CMAS contract with GRM Information Management Services of California, LLC is valid from January 17, 2017, through November 30, 2021.

On October 10, 2010, the Board of Education established the Measure A Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee (BOC). The BOC is charged with verifying the lawful expenditure of bond funds authorized by Measure A approved by voters in June 2010. The BOC is comprised of members representing parents, business, senior citizens, school-parent organizations, and several at-large representatives. The committee is required to submit an annual written report to the Board, in public session, with a statement whether the district is in compliance with the requirements of Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution, and a summary of the committee's proceedings and activities for the preceding year. The Annual Report reflects activity for the fiscal period of July 1, 2015, through June 30, 2016.

The BOC advises the public that the district is in compliance with Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution. Bond proceeds have been expended on projects set forth in the ballot measure. No proceeds have been used for teacher or administrative salaries or other school operating expenditures. Audits have been performed as prescribed by law.
