For the second year, the Kaiser Entities will administer the influenza vaccine and perform certain administrative and promotional services at district facilities to students who are enrolled in district schools or programs.

An annual agreement for the provision of educationally related mental health services between the County of Orange Health Care Agency (HCA) and the Garden Grove Unified School District has been established for individual special education students who require residential placement services as determined by their Individualized Education Program (IEP). Agenda Item 5 – C: College Board's Early Participation Program PSAT/NMSQT

The College Board's Early Participation Program is an initiative to support the involvement of all students in the process of preparing for college at an earlier age. Students' earlier involvement in the PSAT/NMSQT program will also expose them to a wealth of college planning and preparation tools.

The College Board supports this initiative by providing districts with access to additional savings when districts pay to engage at least one grade of pre-junior students in taking the PSAT/NMSQT. The College Board's Early Participation Program will serve up to 3,336 10<sup>th</sup> grade students and 3,504 11<sup>th</sup> grade students at a rate of \$11.00 per student. This rate is reduced by 26 percent for all students enrolled in 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> grade. If approved, the district would offer this Early Participation Program to 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> grade students in the 2016-17 school year. The district has been participating in the program since 2007.

Art Masters, Inc. offers instructional art programs to elementary school sites in the district. They provide full-day or half-day lecture and visual media assemblies. The number of assemblies for each school site varies. The school's Parent Teacher Association (PTA) or Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) pay for the presentations.

Although there is no direct cost to the district general fund, district-approved organizations require approval by the Board of Education to enter into a contract. This carries with it the agreement to guarantee payment of the consultant's fees. The administration and the parents of the participating schools have designed plans to confirm prepayment, which would relieve the district of that liability. Agenda Item 6 – B: Resolution No. 8 – Ordering of Election to Authorize Issuance of School Bonds

Voters overwhelmingly approved Measure A in 2010 to undertake the first phase of repairs and upgrades to local schools, many of which were built 40 to 95 years ago, and the citizens' bond oversight committee has verified that all funds have been spent on voter-approved priorities. The district has recently conducted a thorough assessment of its school facility needs and has identified the second phase of repairs and upgrades that are beyond the scope of Measure A and its current operating budget. The passage of a bond measure would provide a guaranteed source of local funding for this next phase of improvements. A bond measure would benefit local schools and no bond funds could be taken away by the state or other school districts. The district has submitted facility plans to the Department of State Architect and California Department of Education to further modernize school facilities. The district is eligible to apply for its fair share of State Facility Program funds, and if granted the state funds, the district would need to provide a local match for said funds.

The Board approved consultant services to conduct a voter opinion survey to test the willingness of voters to support a local Proposition 39 school bond. The results were presented at a public study session and voters were supportive of a general obligation bond.

Agenda Item 6 – K: California Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program Grant

In May 2008, the National School Lunch Act was amended to add the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program (FFVP) which allows competitive grant opportunities for public elementary schools to participate. The purpose of the grant is to provide all children in eligible schools with a variety of free fresh fruit and vegetable snacks throughout the day as a supplement and to teach students about good nutrition. The district's Food Services Department submitted an application for potentially eligible schools, and the California Department of Education Nutrition Services Department selected schools based on the percentages of low-income students eligible for free or reduced-price meals and their ability to properly implement and operate the FFVP. The grant allocation is approximately \$53 per student through a reimbursement claim process. The district was notified that six elementary schools are eligible in 2016-17: Clinton, Eisenhower, Hazard, Heritage, Russell, and Simmons. The total grant award for the six schools is \$206,180. Fruits and vegetables will be served during the morning recess a minimum of two to three times weekly, and will be administered by the district's Food Services Department.

As salary schedules are developed, teachers, and classified staff always receive the same benefits including longevity. Effective July 1, 2015, the four bargaining units (GGEA, GGPPSA, CSEA, and Supervisory), along with confidential employees, received a change to their longevity structure. No change was made to the management employees longevity structure; therefore, it is recommended that the Board of Education approve changes to the management anniversary increments, which would align them with the bargaining units' anniversary increments as follows: 1) compression of the certificated management anniversary increment schedule from after 26 years to after 25 years to align with certificated longevity (GGEA and GGPPSA); and 2) additional to the classified management anniversary increment schedule 25 years longevity to align with CSEA and Supervisory.
