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Agenda Item 7 – D: Minimum Wage Increase

On January 1, 2017, the minimum wage in California will increase to \$10.50 per hour. This increase will impact the hourly rate paid to high school student workers and student worker-trainees employed through the WorkAbility Program.

In order to comply with the change in state law, the district's high school Student Worker rate should increase to \$10.50 per hour. The Student Worker-Trainee rate (paid at 85 percent of minimum wage) should increase to \$8.93 per hour.
