#### PROGRAMS AND INSTRUCTION

Agenda Item 5 – A: Application for the California Department of Education's Career and Technical Education Incentive Grant

The California Department of Education has developed the Career and Technical Education Incentive Grant to encourage new secondary Career and Technical Education (CTE) pathways and to maintain and strengthen existing CTE programs. School districts, county offices of education, charter schools, and joint powers authorities are eligible to apply for grant funding. A public school district may apply as an individual applicant in addition to applying as a partner district in a regional collaboration for additional funds. Matching funds are required to be eligible for the grant and will be funded by CTE/ROP and Perkins budgets. We anticipate the amount of the award to be and not exceed \$4,797,856.

Funds from the grant will be used to support high-quality Career and Technical Education programs in Garden Grove Unified School District. To ensure sustainability, the majority of grant funds will be allotted to classroom equipment, books, supplies, capital outlay projects, and professional development. The term of the grant is January 15, 2016, through June 30, 2017.

#### 6. BUSINESS

Agenda Item 6 – A: Acceptance of First Interim Report

Education Code Sections 42130 and 42131 (a)(1) require that a report covering the financial and budgetary status of the district be submitted to the governing board for the period ending October 31. The report must be approved by the governing board no later than 45 days after the close of the period. The governing board must certify whether or not the school district is able to meet its financial obligations for the remainder of the fiscal year and two subsequent years.

The First Interim Report for Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balances is submitted for the period ending October 31, 2015. This report uses the 2015-16 Adopted Budget Report as the base and provides a comparison of the actual and projected revenues and expenditures.

Based on available financial information, the governor's proposed budget and current forecasts, the district will be able to meet its financial obligations for the balance of the fiscal year and two subsequent fiscal years, therefore, assigning a positive certification to its First Interim Budget. In submitting the 2015-16 First Interim Report, the Board understands its fiduciary responsibility to maintain fiscal solvency for the current and subsequent two fiscal years.

Effective October 12, 1994, the State of California approved the use of California Multiple Award Schedules (CMAS) by local governments (i.e. city, county, district, or other local governmental body empowered to expend public funds) for information technology products and services. Using a CMAS contract would be a cost-effective manner of procurement for information technology services in the installation of the Wide Area Network (WAN).

Public Contracts Code Sections 10298, 10299, and 12100 provide that the governing board of any school district, without advertising for bids, may authorize any public agency to purchase equipment and services for its use in the manner in which the public agency is authorized by law to make such purchases. The State of California authorized school districts to purchase product and services from TeraBand Technologies, Inc. (CMAS Contract Nos. 3-15-70-2466C and 3-15-70-2466D) on the California Multiple Award Schedules in accordance with the same specifications, terms, and conditions. The State of California CMAS contract with TeraBand Technologies, Inc. CMAS Contract No. 3-15-70-2466C is valid through October 31, 2017, for information technology services; and CMAS Contract No. 3-15-70-2466D is valid through September 30, 2017, for information technology products.

On January 1, 2016, the minimum wage in California will increase to \$10 per hour. This increase will impact the hourly rate paid to high school student workers and student worker-trainees employed through the WorkAbility Program.

In order to comply with the change in state law, the district's high school student worker rate should increase to \$10 per hour. The student worker-trainee rate (paid at 85 percent of minimum wage) should increase to \$8.50 per hour.

It is recommended that the Board approve the following salary increases: student worker to \$10.00 per hour, and student worker-trainee to \$8.50 per hour, effective January 1, 2016.
